What is the Auburn Healthcare Neighbourhood?

Healthcare neighbourhoods are a localised approach to integration of care. They focus on building relationships, trust, shared vision and bottom-up change in a defined geographic region.

The Western Sydney Local Health District (WSLHD) and Western Sydney Primary Health Network (WSPHN) are partnering with the Agency for Clinical Innovation (ACI) to build a well-connected neighbourhood network in Auburn focussing on culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) people.

The Healthcare Neighbourhood includes the wider health and social care system that wraps around and integrates with primary care, consumers, carers and families to deliver a single, cohesive health system.

The Healthcare Neighbourhood Collaborative

Are you interested in improving system connectedness? The WSPHN, the WSLHD and the ACI invite all health and social service providers in the Auburn Healthcare Neighbourhood to participate in the Healthcare Neighbourhoods Collaborative.

This is an opportunity for care providers to trial bottom-up improvements for CALD people. The Collaborative will focus on the following topic areas:

- Overcoming barriers to accessing healthcare
- Using interpreters to improve access and equity
- Improving patients' knowledge of health services and the system
- Enhancing the patient journey by delivering more coordinated services

A Collaborative is a way for neighbours to work together to explore solutions to identified issues and barriers, trial solutions via smallscale rapid changes at practice level, measure the success of those trials and reflect on and share what is or isn't working as we go.

Overview

The Collaborative is structured around three workshops where health and social service providers from the local area (neighbours) come together to share ideas, build stronger relationships, discuss opportunities for improvement and learn how to trial changes in their workplaces.

After each workshop improvements are trialled in practice and recorded on an online portal. Participants can keep in touch with their neighbours, ask questions and share ideas via an online portal.

Three sites in NSW (Auburn, Hornsby/Ku-ring-gai and Upper Blue Mountains) are taking part, so as well as strengthening relationships and working on improvements with others in the Auburn Neighbourhood, participants can share ideas, resources and learnings with other local areas in NSW via the portal.

Methodology

A Collaborative promotes rapid change, allowing participating teams to achieve benefits and results in short time frames.

Participants will receive training in Collaborative Methodology and ongoing support to trial changes using Plan Do Study Act (PDSA) cycles.

How it works

Participants:

- 1. Nominate to participate via an expression of interest
- 2. Complete a baseline self-assessment survey
- 3. Form Improvement Teams based on shared interest in topics
- 4. Attend three learning workshops
- 5. In between workshops, trial small scale, self-identified changes and record the results
- 6. Complete an end of program self-assessment survey.

Benefits of participating

- Meet other people who provide health and care services in the Auburn area
- Learn about the work of other local services
- Increase your awareness of referral pathways
- Learn how to trial changes in your workplace using a simple structured methodology
- Be supported to implement your ideas for improvement
- Build stronger relationships with your neighbours as you work together on shared goals
- Improve information flow and communication
- Develop peer consultation and support networks with your neighbours
- Professional development opportunity including CPD points.

Time and resource commitment

The collaborative will run for nine months starting with an introductory webinar in August 2019 (you can either attend the live webinar online or watch a recording afterwards).

The workshops will be held on Wednesday evenings in the Auburn area for 2 ½ hours each. Attendance at all three workshops is essential.

After each workshop is an activity period and commitment will be between 15 minutes and 2 hours per week. This includes planning, implementing and recording outcomes for improvements you choose to trial, and regular communication with your Improvement Team and project support from the WSPHN, WSLHD or ACI.

Where possible, practices and services are encouraged to nominate two or three people to take part who can provide leadership and influence change at the workplace level (clinicians or non-clinical staff).

Participation in the collaborative is **free** and the following support will be provided:

- Three learning workshops including professional facilitators, training in quality improvement methodology, translating and interpreting services (when required) and catering.
- An online orientation webinar and a handbook to guide progress
- Access to a secure online sharing platform to record PDSA cycles, track your progress, share information and resources and link the three NSW sites
- ACI, LHD and PHN project officers will provide implementation and program delivery support via the online platform and regular teleconferences/phone calls.

A light dinner will be provided prior to workshops.

Transport and any parking will be at your own expense.
